In Revelation chapters 2-3, there are seven churches that are

given specific messages by Jesus Christ.

There is a common structure to each of the letters. They all contain:

- a) An opening description of Christ, the one speaking, which reflects back on the image of Christ in chapter 1.
- b) Commendations (except for Laodecia)
- c) Rebukes with consequences for continued disobedience (except Smyrna, and Philadelphia)
- e) Calls to repent or hold fast
- f) All end with a promise for those who overcome, for the faithful.

While the messages are directed to specific churches, the whole book was sent to *every* church, so these rebukes and commendations serve as warnings and encouragements for all.



The church in Ephesus was established by Paul. (Acts 18:19-21, Acts 19:1-20).

The Greek goddess
Artemis was worshipped
in Ephesus. The growth of
the church in Ephesus,
meant a loss for local
businesses which made
shrines and idols for
Artemis, so riots erupted.
Paul was forced to leave.
(Acts 19:21-41)

When Paul returned, it was to an established church, and he spent his time encouraging the elders. (Acts 20:17-38)

Paul wrote to the Ephesians from prison in Rome, but the writing of Irenaeus tells us it was likely John who later tended that church (along with the other churches of the region).

PRAISE GOD for his care for his church, and for his Word which guides us.

CONFESS to God our lack of love for others in the church

ASK GOD to renew us in love for him, and for one another in the church

PRAY ALSO for those among us facing difficulties, and for those new to the faith. Pray that we will be able to help them.
