PASTORAL PRAYER with Rev Litha Heshusius

SCRIPTURE READING 1 Corinthians 12:31, then 14:1-18

Read by Rev Phil Campbell

^{12:31}But earnestly desire the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way...

... ^{14:1} Pursue **love**, and earnestly desire the spiritual gifts, especially that you may prophesy. ²For one who speaks in a tongue speaks not to men but to God; for no one understands him, but he utters mysteries in the Spirit. ³ On the other hand, the one who prophesies speaks to people for their **upbuilding** and encouragement and consolation. ⁴The one who speaks in a tongue **builds up himself**, but the one who prophesies builds up the church. ⁵ Now I want you all to speak in tongues, but even more to prophesy. The one who prophesies is greater than the one who speaks in tongues, unless someone interprets, **so that the church may be built up**.

⁶Now, brothers, if I come to you speaking in tongues, **how will I benefit you** unless I bring you some revelation or knowledge or prophecy or teaching? ⁷If even lifeless instruments, such as the flute or the harp, do not give distinct notes, how will anyone know what is played? ⁸And if the bugle gives an indistinct sound, who will get ready for battle? ⁹So with yourselves, if with your tongue you utter speech that is not intelligible, how will anyone know what is said? For you will be speaking into the air. ¹⁰There are doubtless many different languages in the world, and none is without meaning, ¹¹ but if I do not know the meaning of the language, I will be a foreigner to the speaker and the speaker a foreigner to me. ¹²So with yourselves, since you are eager for manifestations of the Spirit, **strive to excel in building up the church**.

¹³Therefore, one who speaks in a tongue should pray that he may interpret. ¹⁴For if I pray in a tongue, my spirit prays but my mind is unfruitful. ¹⁵ What am I to do? I will pray with my spirit, but I will pray with my mind also; I will sing praise with my spirit, but I will sing with my mind also. ¹⁶ Otherwise, if you give thanks with your spirit, how can anyone in the position of an outsider say "Amen" to your thanksgiving when he does not know what you are saying? ¹⁷ For you may be giving thanks well enough, but the other person is not being built up. ¹⁸ I thank God that I speak in tongues more than all of you. ¹⁹ Nevertheless, in church I would rather speak five words with my mind in order to instruct others, than ten thousand words in a tongue.

Hear me when I call O' God of my righteousness: thou hast set me at liberty when I was in trouble, have mercy upon me and hearken unto my prayer. O ye sons of men, how long will ye blaspheme mine honour: and have such pleasure in vanity and seek after leasing? Know this also, that the Lord hath chosen to himself the man that is godly: when I call upon the Lord he will hear me. Stand in awe and sin not: commune with your own heart, and in your chamber be still. Offer the sacrifice of righteousness: and put your trust in the Lord. There be many that say: Who will shew us any good? Lord lift thou up: the light of thy countenance upon us. Thou has put gladness in my heart: since the time that their corn and wine and oil increased.

SCRIPTURE READING Continuing in 1 Corinthians 14 from vs 20 to 26 Read by Rev Phil Campbell

²⁰ Brothers, do not be children in your thinking. Be infants in evil, but in vour thinking be mature. ²¹ In the Law it is written, "By people of strange tongues and by the lips of foreigners will I speak to this people, and even then they will not listen to me, says the Lord." ²² Thus tongues are a sign not for believers but for unbelievers, while prophecy is a sign not for unbelievers but for believers. ²³ If, therefore, the whole church comes together and all speak in tongues, and outsiders or unbelievers enter, will they not say that you are out of your minds? ²⁴ But if all prophesy, and an unbeliever or outsider enters, he is convicted by all, he is called to account by all, 25 the secrets of his heart are disclosed, and so, falling on his face, he will worship God and declare that God is really among you. ²⁶ What then, brothers? When you come together, each one has a hymn, has a lesson, has a revelation, has a tongue, or has an interpretation. Let all things be done for building up. ²⁷ If any speak in a tongue, let there be only two or at most three, and each in turn, and let someone interpret.

For further reflection (v27-40)

²⁸ But if there is no one to interpret, *let each of them keep silent in church* and speak to himself and to God. ²⁹ Let two or three prophets speak, and let the others weigh what is said. ³⁰ If a revelation is made to another sitting there, *let the first be silent.* ³¹ For you can all prophesy one by one, so that all may learn and all be encouraged, ³² and the spirits of prophets are subject to prophets. ³³ For God is not a God of confusion but of peace.

As in all the churches of the saints, ³⁴ the wives *should keep silent* in the churches. For they are not permitted to speak, but should be in submission, as the Law also says. ³⁵ If there is anything they desire to learn, let them ask their husbands at home. For it brings shame for a wife to speak in church.

³⁶ Or was it from you that the word of God came? Or are you the only ones it has reached? ³⁷ If anyone thinks that he is a prophet, or spiritual, he should acknowledge that the things I am writing to you are a command of the Lord. ³⁸ If anyone does not recognise this, he is not recognised. ³⁹ So, my brothers, earnestly desire to prophesy, and do not forbid speaking in tongues. ⁴⁰ But all things should be done decently and in order.

SERMON Cross-Shaped Words (1 Corinthians 14)

Earnestly desire the 'greater gifts', said Paul back in chapter 12, before launching into his famous description of 'love.' But in a world both then and now fixated with the spiritually spectacular, what do the 'greater gifts' look like? The answer might surprise you!
